(a) The Contractor shall perform professional services to provide Annual Subscription to a Commercial Social Analytics Platform for the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo, Japan, in accordance with the specifications and terms and conditions set forth herein.

(b) The Contractor shall complete all work (including furnishing all labor, material, equipment, and services) required under this contract. This price shall include, but not limited to, all labor, materials, transportation, insurance, overhead, and profit.

1.1.2 Type of Contract:

This is a firm fixed price purchase order with base year of twelve months and two one-year periods at the option of the U.S. Government. These prices shall include all labor, materials, insurances, overhead, and profit.

1.1.3 Offers and Payment in U.S. Dollars

(1) U.S. firms are eligible to be paid in U.S. dollars. U.S. firms desiring to be paid in U.S. dollars should submit their offers in U.S. dollars. A U.S. firm is defined as a company which operates as a corporation incorporated under the laws of a state within the United States.

1.2 Continuation to SF-18, Request for Quotations (RFQ) Number 19JA80-22-Q-0044, Block 11(b), Schedule of Supplies/Services

Statement of Work:

Media Monitoring and Analysis Tool

1.2.1 General

(1) Background:

U.S. Embassy Tokyo is seeking a single comprehensive information tool to monitor and analyze the traditional and social media domains in which it conducts public diplomacy. The tool will fill a critical need of Mission Japan (the embassy and the affiliate U.S. consulates in Japan) to acquire a nuanced understanding of the performance of its digital media operations, while increasing the speed and scope of its ability to process actionable information from the global online news and conversation environment.

(2) Scope:

The Contractor shall provide a commercially available software-as-a-service (SAAS)-based tool that enables users to monitor, search, filter, analyze, and report on global digital news and social media content related to the Mission, its programs and activities, and its policy goals and objectives. This capability shall include exploration and filter functions to tailor the aperture for information delivery—i.e., from monitoring of thematic issues and search topics across a broad base of sources to targeted drill-downs into the analytics of the Mission's own as well as peer/competitor accounts. The tool shall also incorporate built-in capabilities to analyze audience sentiment and extract audience demographics. Stakeholders shall be able to digest information in a variety of formats, including but not limited to reports, dashboards, and downloaded data.

(3) Objective:

Embassy Tokyo's Public Affairs Section (PAS) will use the media monitoring and analysis tool to pull fine-grained, data-driven insights from the global torrent of online news and conversations, feeding these insights into the development of strategic communications campaigns and digital media strategies. The end-state objective is to improve the reach and impact of the Mission's social media delivery accounts as they promote Chief of Mission strategic priorities and Mission Japan's integrated country strategy. These accounts include:

- Twitter (six embassy, six consular accounts)
- Facebook (one embassy, five consular accounts)
- Instagram (one embassy, three consular accounts)
- YouTube (one embassy account)

PAS will also draw upon the tool's "social listening" and audience-profiling features to assess and shape its programs and connect to target populations in Japan. In particular, the ability to retrieve audience demographic information will support PAS's opinion research activities and conduct of survey/focus groups. PAS will also use the tool as a media engagement resource, identifying journalists, editors, correspondents, social media influencers, and bloggers across topics and geographical areas.

1.2.2 Specific Requirements/Tasks

(1) Task One: Online & Social Media Monitoring

Ability to track global online sources for news and social conversations relevant to Embassy Tokyo and the four regional U.S. consulates in Japan:

- Ability to track >200 U.S., regional, and local news sources, including Japanese national media outlets and major Japanese prefectural and metropolitan outlets.
- Ability to track social media platforms, including Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, and blogs/Forums (e.g., Reddit, Ameba). Full API access to Twitter data for the past 12 months via firehouse license.
- Ability to track sources in multiple languages besides English, with Japanese as a minimum requirement.
- Ability to maintain at least five saved search "feeds" with unlimited Boolean keyword strings. Unlimited coverage per search (no cap on coverage). Ability to change the searches at keywords at any given time.
- Ability to conduct ad hoc searches with unlimited coverage and statistical and graphical analyses.

(2) Task Two: Audience Sentiment and Demographics Analysis

- Ability to capture sentiment trends across topics and conversations via an embedded artificial intelligence/natural-language processing mechanism.
- Ability to analyze and profile audience characteristics, including the ability to perform demographic segmentation of followers of individual social media accounts. Target demographic categories include age, gender, nationality, language, occupation, location, interests and affinities, and influences. In the response to the RFQ, contractor should detail which specific demographics it can deliver by platform (e.g., Twitter, Facebook, Instagram) and whether that information is limited to Embassy-owned accounts. If the contractor offers a range of audience analysis capabilities, contractor may offer multiple solutions (see sub-section 3.2(4), Content of Proposal).

(3) Task Three: Platform Data and Intelligence Delivery

- 24/7 access to a password protected, online platform for at least five user log-ons. Language for the interface and any reports should be in English.
- Customized and interactive dashboards that provide real-time monitoring, filtering, and analysis of news coverage and social media conversations in terms of content, volume, sentiment, reach, geographical spread, channels and sources, top posters and influencers, languages, and momentum.
 - o Amplification in keyword search results of frequently occurring terms/responses that provide indicators of the subjects and issues driving the conversation.
 - o Identification of the most quoted or referenced sources—search results should be able to display the volume of engagements for an individual source in addition to a total rollup of mentions across all sources.
- Ability to specify time periods for analysis: per day, week, month, or custom date range.
- Ability to generate automated, stakeholder-ready audience analysis reports.
- Ability to download raw data in MS Excel or other database-friendly format.
- Automated alerts with adjustable frequency (daily, weekly).

(4) Task Four: Customer Service

- Onboarding: A contractor expert(s) shall provide initial customer training in the set-up, use, and customization of the tool.
- Ongoing Support: The contractor shall provide account technical support via phone, email, or online during regular business hours in the Japan standard time zone and/or via a 24/7 help center. In addition, 24-hour emergency online support must be available during off-business hours.

1.2.3 Other Applicable Conditions

(1) Period of Performance

The period of performance for this contract is one (1) base 12-month and two (2) 12-month option periods. The period of performance will be determined after award.

(2) Place of Performance

The principal place of work will be at the contractor's facility or its designated alternate workplace.

(3) Disclosure of Information

The Government will discuss with the Contractor after an award of the order.

(4) Advertisements, Publicizing Awards, and News Releases

All press releases or announcements about programs, projects, and contract awards related to this procurement need to be cleared by Embassy Tokyo PAS and the embassy's contracting officer. Under no circumstances shall the contractor, or anyone acting on behalf of the contractor, refer to the products or services furnished pursuant to the provisions of this contract in any publicity news release, commercial advertising, or marketing demonstration to third parties without first obtaining explicit written consent to do so from Embassy Tokyo PAS and the contracting officer. (i) A court within the United States is able to exercise primary supervision over the administration of the trust; and
(ii) One or more United States persons have the authority to control all substantial decisions of the trust.

(b) This clause applies only to foreign persons. It implements [26 U.S.C. 5000C](#) and its implementing regulations at 26 CFR 1.5000C-1 through 1.5000C-7.

(c)(1) If the Contractor is a foreign person and has only a partial or no exemption to the withholding, the Contractor shall include the Department of the Treasury Internal Revenue Service Form W-14, Certificate of Foreign Contracting Party Receiving Federal Procurement Payments, with each voucher or invoice submitted under this contract throughout the period in which this status is applicable. The excise tax withholding is applied at the payment level, not at the contract level. The Contractor should revise each IRS Form W-14 submission to reflect the exemption (if any) that applies to that particular invoice, such

as a different exemption applying. In the absence of a completed IRS Form W-14 accompanying a payment request, the default withholding percentage is 2 percent for the section 5000C withholding for that payment request. Information about IRS Form W-14 and its separate instructions is available via the internet at www.irs.gov/w14 .

(2) If the Contractor is a foreign person and has indicated in its offer in the provision [52.229-11](#), Tax on Certain Foreign Procurements—Notice and Representation, that it is fully exempt from the withholding, and certified the full exemption on the IRS Form W-14, and if that full exemption no longer applies due to a change in circumstances during the performance of the contract that causes the Contractor to become subject to the withholding for the 2 percent excise tax then the Contractor shall—

- (i) Notify the Contracting Officer within 30 days of a change in circumstances that causes the Contractor to be subject to the excise tax withholding under [26 U.S.C. 5000C](#); and

- (8) PSC 9610, Ores;
- (9) PSC 9620, Minerals, Natural and Synthetic; and
- (10) PSC 9630, Additive Metal Materials.

"Place of manufacture" means the place where an end product is assembled out of components, or otherwise made or processed from raw materials into the finished product that is to be provided to the Government. If a product is disassembled and reassembled, the place of reassembly is not the place of manufacture.

"Predecessor" means an entity that is replaced by a successor and includes any predecessors of the predecessor.

"Restricted business operations" means business operations in Sudan that include power production activities, mineral extraction activities, oil-related activities, or the production of military equipment, as those terms are defined in the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007 (Pub. L. 110-174). Restricted business operations do not include business operations that the person (as that term is defined in Section 2 of the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007) conducting the business can demonstrate-

- (1) Are conducted under contract directly and exclusively with the regional government of southern Sudan;

in the case of a service-disabled veteran with permanent and severe disability, the spouse or permanent caregiver of such veteran.

(2) Service-disabled veteran means a veteran, as defined in [38 U.S.C. 101\(2\)](#), with a disability that is service-connected, as defined in [38 U.S.C. 101\(16\)](#).

"Small business concern"-

- (1) A citizen or resident of the United States;
- (2) A domestic partnership;
- (3) A domestic corporation;
- (4) Any estate (other than a foreign estate, within the meaning of 26 U.S.C. 701(a) (31)); and
- (5) Any trust if—
 - (i) A court within the United States is able to exercise primary supervision over the administration of the trust; and
 - (ii) One or more United States persons have the authority to control all substantial decisions of the trust.

(b) Unless exempted, there is a 2 percent tax of the amount of a specified Federal procurement payment on any foreign person receiving such payment. See 26 U.S.C. 5000C and its implementing regulations at 26 CFR 1.5000C-1 through 1.5000C-7.

(c) Exemptions from withholding under this provision are described at 26 CFR 1.5000C-1(d) (5) through (7). The Offeror would claim an exemption from the withholding by using the Department of the Treasury Internal Revenue Service Form W-14, Certificate of Foreign Contracting Party Receiving Federal Procurement Payments, available via the internet at www.irs.gov/w14.
